



## Funding Special Education in Michigan Focus on a Quality, Adequate, and Equitable System

**Vision:** Provide a quality, adequate and equitable system of funding for the most vulnerable students in Michigan. This system would be a balanced system with three (3) streams of funding - federal, state, and local – at its core.

**Urgency:** Currently the Michigan system of special education is underfunded, statewide, by \$706 million based on <u>2019-20 data</u> from the Michigan Department of Education.

**Primary reason for shortfall:** Historic underfunding of special education starting with the allocation of a foundation allowance for all students (see <u>Special Education Funding in Michigan: Examining the Shortfall</u>). Currently, rather than being guaranteed a foundation for all students and support for additional special education costs, school districts only receive the greater of:

- the foundation allowance for a child with an individualized education program (IEP) plus a hold harmless amount relating to 1997 costs
   or
- 2) the equivalent of 28.6138 percent of the special education expense associated with the child and 70.4165 percent of their related specialized transportation costs (Durant percents).

**Ask:** Provide funding to improve the quality and enhance the outcomes for children with IEPs reflecting the additional programs and services needed.

## • State Funding Focus (in order of priority):

- 1. Foundation + Durant settlement (Calley Report, 2017)
- 2. Increase and modify Section 56 Equalization Formula (Calley Report, 2017)
- 3. NEW section for additional reimbursement of expenses for students requiring high-cost programming
- 4. Section 51f reimbursement after SE Foundation + Durant % fully funded

## • Local Funding Focus:

• Allow all Intermediate School Districts to levy at least 3 mills for special education
