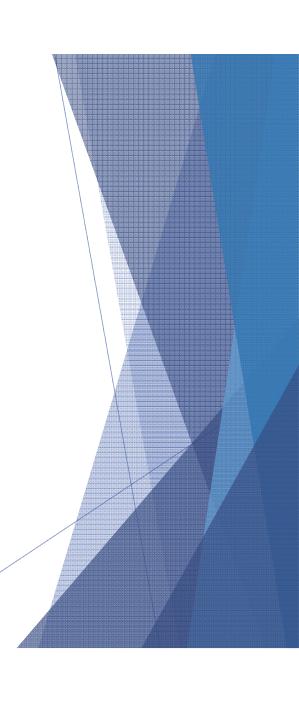

History - How Did We Get Here?

- Durant Settlement 1997
 - ► Changed S.E. funding formula
- ► Lt. Governor Calley Special Education Funding Subcommittee Report November, 2017
 - ► Recommendations for Additional Areas of Investment to Improve Educational Outcomes for Students with Disabilities
- ► MAISA SEILN Recommendations April, 2022
 - ► Recommended 5 funding focus areas
- ➤ 2022-23 School Aid Act PA-144 (Senate Bill 845)
 - ► Funds all districts at Durant %'s PLUS 75% of S.E. Foundation (in general)

Durant Settlement - What Did it Do?

- ▶ Durant I Settled in 1997
 - ▶ Provided for a Maintenance of Support (MOS) Provision
 - ▶ 28.6138% of S.E. classroom costs
 - ▶ 70.4165% of S.E. transportation costs
 - Support for the School Lunch Program
 - Prohibited Unfunded Mandates
- State Did Not Pay the Foundation Plus the Percentage Allocation
 - ▶ Paid the Greater of the Foundation Plus a Hold Harmless Amount **OR** the Durant Percentages

Calley Report Recommendation

- ▶ 6. Provide both the 28.61 percent reimbursement associated with special education expenses funding and the foundation allowance for all students with disabilities.
- ► Currently, school districts receive the foundation allowance for a child with an IEP or the equivalent 28.61 percent of the special education expense associated with the child (including 70.4 percent of special education transportation costs) or the foundation allowance, whichever amount is greater. Students who need more resources should get more resources. In researching the special education funding systems in two other states that use the reimbursement methodology, the Special Education Funding Subcommittee found that Nebraska reimburses between 51 and 57 percent of the overall special education expenses, whereas Wyoming reimburses 100 percent of the expenses. 54 Students with disabilities should be funded at the base amount as their typical peers. Their special needs, then, should be reimbursed at the current practice of 28.61 percent.

MAISA-SEILN Recommendations

State Funding Focus (in order of priority):

- 1. Foundation + Durant settlement (*Calley Report*, 2017)
- 2. Increase and modify Section 56 Equalization Formula (*Calley Report*, 2017)
- 3. NEW section for additional reimbursement of expenses for students requiring high-cost programming
- 4. Section 51f reimbursement after SE Foundation + Durant % fully funded

Local Funding Focus:

 Allow all Intermediate School Districts to levy at least 3 mills for special education

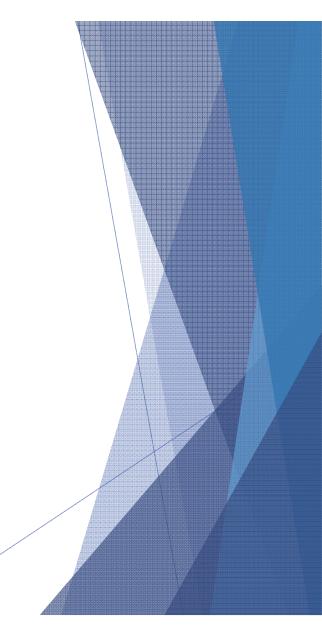
FY '23 School Aid came CLOSE to meeting Priority #1!!

2022-23 School Aid Act

Recap of FY '23 S.E. Revenue (as it will show up on p. 2 of your State Aid Status Report in the "Other Current Year Calculation Information" section)

- Sec. 51e(2) Every district will receive 75% of their S.E. Foundation for Sec. 52 blended count here
- Sec. 51a(2)(b) Every district will receive 25% of their S.E. Foundation for Sec. 52 blended count here.
- Sec. 51a(2)(c) Districts will receive the amount of Durant funding (28.6138% of 4096 costs & 70.4165% of 4094 costs) that is in excess of the 25% Foundation received in Sec. 51a(2)(b) here.
- Sec. 51a(3) A small number of districts will continue to receive S.E. Hold Harmless funding here. This occurs for those districts where the amount of Durant revenue received under Sec. 51a(2)(c) is still less than the amount of Hold Harmless revenue earned under this section. This hold harmless funding will go away in future years if they pay 100% of the S.E. Foundation, as anticipated under the current "intent" language.
- Sec. 51e(3) A small number of districts will continue to receive some Hold Harmless funding here. This occurs for those districts where the amount of funds they are receiving under Sec. 51e(2) for 75% of their S.E. Foundation is less than the amount received in FY '22 under Sec. 51f. It is unclear how long this categorical would continue to be calculated in this manner in future years.

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Things to Think About/Consider

Increase in S.E. Revenue could impact the following areas:

- Districts operating Center-Based programs
 - State Aid for these programs will increase, reducing the unfunded amount that they need to be reimbursed for
- ► Billbacks for S.E. programs
 - ▶ If your S.E. plan has you billing back districts for some S.E. programs, the increased State Aid reimbursement will reduce the amount you need to bill those districts back for those programs
- ► P.A. 18 payouts
 - ▶ Above factors will change amount available for P.A. 18 distribution
 - If unreimbursed costs is a part of your formula
- ► Future of 51e(3) & 51a(7)
- ▶ IDEA allocations to LEA's
